A Different Perspective

Have you noticed that some people can talk around and over and through and under a subject before they eventually (if ever) get to the point? Also, the very same body of information can be presented to two different people and one person immediately grasps the most important point(s) but the other person totally misses the point. My best friend is one of those people who can size up a problem or person and intuitively understand the kind of person she has just met or understand the dynamics and crucial parts of the problem better than another person who has been trying for weeks (or longer) to solve the problem. She is a cancer researcher and her unique way of looking at a problem has often allowed her to quickly solve a problem which others have been wrestling with for months. We've discussed her unique talent and as she explains it, "I just look at things differently than other people."

I have another friend who often dismisses himself as "not too smart" yet can fix almost anything mechanical, no matter how complex. He told me one time, "I can just look at a machine and I seem to understand how it works and how to fix it." This man is also very self-effacing when it comes to his scriptural knowledge. He talks very slowly and often so softly that one must strain to hear.

Someone who doesn't know him might buy into his claim of lack of intelligence, but he is one of the greatest Bible scholars I have ever met. Some can quote from memory multiple scriptures on almost any subject and explain in great depth the meaning of a particular passage, but although they may be like an Aaron to my friend who is more of a Moses, the eloquent expositor cannot hold a candle to my slow talking, barely audible friend. This is because my Southern Missouri friend gets it!! He understands that scripture is not complicated and his life proclaims that simplicity. When the

Pharisees who prided themselves on their great scriptural acumen came to Jesus and had one of their elite, a lawyer, ask Jesus what "the greatest command is," Jesus surprised the Pharisees with the simplicity of his answer. Matthew 22: 34 When the Pharisees learned that the Sadducees could not argue with Jesus' answers to them, the Pharisees met together. 35 One Pharisee, who was an expert on the law of Moses, asked Jesus this question to test him: 36 "Teacher, which command in the law is the most important?" 37 Jesus answered, "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your mind.' 38 This is the first and most important command. 39 And the second command is like the first: 'Love your neighbor as you love yourself.' 40 All the law and the writings of the prophets depend on these two commands."

Jesus was trying to explain the heart and soul of God's expectations. Unfortunately, most of those who heard his answer didn't understand. Just as my friend has the unique ability to look at a machine and understand how it works and just as my researcher friend is able to analyze a chemical formula and understand what can solve the puzzle, Jesus gives the nitty gritty of God's expectations. It's not complicated, but many, even some great theologians, seem to miss the point. My Missouri friend gets it! He lives it. That is why he is one of the greatest Bible scholars I know, because he grasps the essence of Christ's teaching. This passage in Matthew 22 (in spite of all of his self deprecation) is not theory to him ... it is who he is.
